

Directions from the Carpark to Hangar 1


- EBG Helicopters parking spaces are indicated with '6'.

- Please follow the numbered photographs to assist you in finding us.



DO'S AND DON'TS

The airfield from which we operate is a busy active airfield operating both fixed wing and helicopters and can be a dangerous environment for the unwary or uninitiated.

We appreciate that the anticipation and excitement of perhaps a first flight in a helicopter may be a little overwhelming. Hopefully, nonetheless an experience that will be remembered for years to come. However, there are a number of Do's and Don'ts that you should be aware of when visiting EBG Helicopters.

- When you arrive with us please make sure that both you and your guests stay within the marked fence line at all times unless you need to visit the Rest Rooms.
- If at any time you wish to discuss, look at or photograph any of our helicopters please ask and a member of our staff will be happy to escort you and answer any questions you may have.
- Please make sure that any children are looked after and appropriately controlled.
- Please do not leave any rubbish lying around as this can cause serious harm to the helicopters.
- We may on occasion escort you to your helicopter whilst the rotors are running, please make sure that you fully understand the briefing and obey any instructions given to you by EBG staff. In no circumstance should you proceed or go out to any helicopter, for whatever reason, without specific authorisation or direction from EBG staff.



COMPRESSED GAS

- Corrosives Materials acids, alkalis, wet cell batteries etc.
- Disabling devices such as mace, pepper spray etc.
- Electro shock weapons (e.g. Tasers) containing dangerous goods such as explosive, compressed gases. Lithium batteries etc.
- Explosives fireworks, flares, Firearms etc.
- Flammable gas cylinders
- Flammable liquids paint, petrol, lighter refills, solvents, varnish etc.
- Flammable solids firelighters etc.
- Oxidising materials bleach, peroxides, some fertilisers etc.
- Strike anywhere matches
- Substances liable to spontaneous combustion
- Substances that emit flammable gases in contact with water
- Toxic (poisonous) substances weed killer, insecticides etc.

No items to be plugged into the Helicopter power sockets

Please advise the helicopter pilot or a member of the operations staff if you wish to take <u>any</u> personal electronic device on board or have any medical related electronic device.

The pilot is responsible for safety and reserves the right to refuse any items being taken on board and also can insist items are switched off mid flight if necessary.

Any misuse of equipment could result in the aircraft landing early with the relevant authorities being notified.
